Master of Philosophy in Indigenous Studies MIS

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Programme aim

The programme provides students with a thorough understanding of:

- the main dimensions of life in indigenous societies in the past and today; the challenges of their future, including culture and ethnicity; colonialism and the history of indigenous peoples; and indigenous resource management and environmental change;
- the emergence of indigenous civic organisations, their present operation as formal and informal systems, including their strategies for self-representation in political processes at different levels—from the local community to the global level;
- the relationship between nation-state and indigenous minorities, including the role of international organisations (UN, ILO); the formulation of legal, land, and resource claims with reference to customary international law; and international recognition human rights, such as the right to self-determination pertaining to indigenous peoples, their interpretation and implementation.

Programme description

Language of instruction: English

Duration: 2 years (120 ECTS credits), full-time study

Degree

The Master's programme in Indigenous Studies (MIS) leads to a Master of Philosophy in Indigenous Studies. The duration of the programme is two years (120 ECTS)

Rationale

The UN Decade for Indigenous Peoples brought indigenous peoples on to the world map as never before. Globally, indigenous peoples' voices are gaining strength and an international movement

of indigenous peoples is gathering momentum. The Declaration of the Rights of Indigenous Peoples adopted by the UN General Assembly in 2007 strongly supports this cause. Despite such positive developments, many indigenous

peoples are still marginalized minorities in need of political recognition and empowerment. Communities suffer from lack of social and economic progress. Moreover, the natural resources on which indigenous peoples base their livelihoods are threatened. These developments, historical experience, and the contemporary context that indigenous people experience across the globe are the thematic focus of this master's programme.

The programme aims to recruit Sami and Nordic students, as well as students from other countries. A mixed group of students will strengthen the comparative aspects of the programme and will contribute to international network building. Selection from among applicants who meet the entry qualifications, aims to ensure a varied, gender-balanced student group

which represents different countries and regions.

Supervision

All students will be allocated an academic supervisor for their individual Master theses.

Course description and outline

Students will take courses totalling 120 study points (ECTS-credits) over two years. In the first year, students take six courses, including one course chosen from a list of electives. The Master's thesis

amounts to 60 credits. The topic of the thesis is chosen on the basis of the interests of the student and within the framework of the topics taught in the first year.

Students will develop their project proposal during the first and second semester and will write the thesis during the third and fourth semesters.

The Master's thesis provides an opportunity for in-depth studies within a chosen field of interest.


Thinking outside of the box

Learning outcome

Knowledge

The students will have:

- thorough knowledge of the history of the global indigenous movement and the situation of indigenous peoples in the Arctic;
- advanced knowledge of indigenous issues including similarities and differences based on the different cultural contexts;
- thorough knowledge of different scholarly theories and methods in indigenous studies, including the challenges posed by indigenous methodologies;
- advanced knowledge of the concepts of indigenous peoples used in research and politics at global and local level, and the scholarly and political debate on these issues;
- competence in analysis in academic indigenous research;
- knowledge of research ethics and the responsibility of the researcher.

Skills

The students will be able to:

- compare the situation of indigenous peoples in different historical and contemporary contexts;
- critically analyse the situation of indigenous peoples based on an interdisciplinary approach to indigenous studies;
- and apply, conduct theoretical analysis of aspects of humani-

- ties and social science theory;
- find and use relevant research methods to produce the data for an independently designed project;
- carry out an independent, research project under supervision.

General competence

The students will be able to:

- analyse professional and research ethical challenges related to indigenous issues;
- apply knowledge and skills on indigenous issues in order to carry out advanced assignments and projects in similar areas;
- use the terminology of indigenous studies and communicate academic work both to specialists and to the general public;
- combine different scholarly approaches to produce new knowledge;

- contribute to new thinking and innovation processes regarding indigenous peoples and minorities.

The MIS programme prepares the students to:

- apply analytical skills to understand the social and cultural contexts of indigenous peoples, their organisations and their rights;
- apply analytical skills to empirical study of indigenous issues cross-culturally and within the frameworks established by nation-states;
- design and carry out independent research project involving data collection through the use of fieldwork methods and/or written sources;
- qualify for work within teaching and education; promotion and implementation of indigenous issues internationally; civil society organization; government and the public sector; project management; and further research and studies in indigenous issues.

DebutUKA

About UiT The Arctic University of Norway

UiT The Arctic University of Norway is located in Northern Norway and has about 12000 students, 10 % of them international. Foreign applicants can take advantage of an increasing number of exchange agreements with universities worldwide. We offer studies in the framework of international exchange programmes such as ERASMUS, North2North, Nordplus, Barentsplus and others. We also welcome free-movers and degree students.

Founded in 1968, UiT is a young, but well established university. The University merged with the University College of Finnmark on 01.08.2013. All campuses in Tromsø and Finnmark are mod-

ern, technically advanced and well equipped. 25% of the academic staff is international. The advantage of an 8:1 student-teacher ratio guarantees close guidance and a good learning environment. A team of international student advisers provides services regarding all aspects of your stay at UiT.

No tuition fees are charged at UiT. The Student Welfare Organisations at both Campuses offer modern accommodation, kindergartens, cafeterias and sports facilities. International students can apply for housing in one of the many student hostels. The Student Counselling Centre organizes special social events and gatherings for international students including ice-skat-

ing. An Introductory programme for new students is arranged each semester, providing assistance on technical and administrative matters and offering opportunities to meet other students.

Most of UiT's English taught Master's degree programmes reflect the specific character of the University's location in the far North. An increasing number of our traditional Norwegian study programmes offer courses of international interest in English. You will find attractive subjects at both Bachelor's and Master's level in all of UiT's six faculties. A one-semester study programme on Arctic Norway, tailor-made for international students, is offered each autumn.
